Meet our Community Award winners

The winners of the reinvigorated Port Phillip community awards have been announced at a ceremony at St Kilda Town Hall.

Now known as the Proudly Port Phillip Community Awards, this was the first presentation of civic awards since 2012.

“We resurrected these awards as members of our diverse community told us they wanted the opportunity to recognise those who make us proud to live, work and play in Port Phillip,” Mayor Heather Cunsolo said.

“Every winner across the five categories goes above and beyond for our community and we are very proud of the contributions they make to our City.”

Citizen of the Year - Joanne and Scott Watkins

Double act Joanne and Scott are the driving force behind the Albert parkrun, Melbourne. Their efforts have led to about 600 people attending each week, making this parkrun the largest parkrun in Australia. The free 5 km community event is held on Saturdays at Albert Park – participants can walk, run, jog, volunteer or spectate.

Young Citizen of the Year - Harshitha Meenakshisundaram

As a Port Phillip Youth Advisory Committee member, Harshitha has helped deliver initiatives including the ‘Amplify Your Voice’ leadership event. Harshitha has contributed to a number of consultations and informed our Council’s work to build more inclusive and safe places for young people.

Community First Award - Veg Out Community Gardens, St Kilda

Veg Out Community Gardens has given hundreds of locals living in apartments an outdoor space to garden and grow produce. Veg Out offers an educational space for sharing knowledge and learning as well as providing opportunities for people, including those from vulnerable groups, to meet and work together.

Sustainability Award - Port Phillip Pickers

The Port Phillip Pickers aim to prevent food waste. Their signature project is picking unwanted olives from the public trees to create local hand-picked, community extra virgin olive oil. In just two years they have turned more than a tonne of unwanted olives into pure, local olive oil for the community to share in.

Small Business of the Year - Space2b Social Design

Space2b Social Design is an art and design social enterprise supporting people seeking asylum, refugees and newly arrived migrants to become financially independent and included in the community. Space2b incorporates a retail outlet, gallery, laneway café, design studio, workshop and training space and small business hub.



Have your say on our draft 2024/25 Budget and Council Plan update

Community consultation opened today for Port Phillip Council's draft Budget 2024/25 and Year 4 Council Plan 2021-31 update.

Mayor Heather Cunsolo said the draft Budget - the last for this Council's four-year term - reflects the many economic challenges being experienced by the City and its diverse community.

"The dilemma for our Council is that the costs of providing services and looking after infrastructure to the standards required by our community are growing much more than inflation and the Victorian Government's rates cap," Cr Cunsolo said.

The draft Budget continues to provide targeted relief for those who need it most as inflation and cost of living pressures, including interest rates, are causing many community members to do it tough.

As it's best practice to ensure our Ratings Strategy remains relevant for our community, we will also be consulting on higher differential rates for derelict and vacant land and unactivated retail land to incentivise landowners and discourage neglect linked to safety and amenity concerns, she said.

Last year, Council was able to pass on a reduced average rate rise after receiving unexpected increases in parking payments and interest. However, this year challenges include more government cost-shifting and construction and service delivery costs running above projected inflation.

The proposed average rate increase of 2.75 per cent for 2024/25 is still significantly below the 3.4 per cent forecast inflation rate over this timeframe.

Cr Cunsolo said delaying key capital works or much needed public space land acquisitions for Port Phillip's growing community would ultimately result in higher costs.

"We are also increasingly having to take on costs passed on by governments."

Despite this, careful financial management, including extra efficiency savings, has provided a strong foundation to deliver a comprehensive, balanced budget.

"We believe this proposed Budget allows us to keep delivering what makes our City so special, from key infrastructure projects and local economy boosting events and activations to the many services our residents deserve and expect," Cr Cunsolo said.

"This draft Budget is aimed at providing positive outcomes for residents now, and in years to come, and we are eager to hear what our community thinks."

Key elements in our draft 2024/25 Budget:

- despite continuing high inflation, the proposed average rate increase of 2.75 per cent is within the Victorian Government's rates cap and below inflation. As the 2023/24 Budget's 2.8 per cent average rate rise was lower than the rates cap, this Budget's proposed rise will be calculated off this lower figure
- a 2.72 per cent rise in the default waste charge to \$203.60, which follows rising waste costs being experienced by all councils
- efficiency savings of \$1.5 million, providing for a total of \$6.4 million in permanent savings to be delivered over this Council's four-year term.
- project investment of \$133 million to maintain, grow and improve services and assets (including over \$44.9 million for land acquisition to provide more public open space)
- Council-funded pensioner rates rebate increasing 4.8 per cent to \$220
- continuing business support offered under the Economic Recovery Package until June 2025
- an extra \$40,000 for food relief
- most fees and charges increasing 3.65 per cent, 0.25 per cent above forecast inflation. Some will be higher and some lower to reflect reasonable user pays charges.

Following careful consideration of all feedback, the 2024/25 draft Budget is due to be adopted on 26 June.

If you've passed by Luna Park or the Palais Theatre recently you may have noticed some changes to traffic conditions.

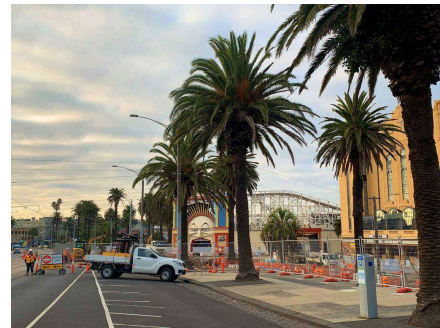
The Upper Esplanade (westbound only) has been closed while we construct vehicle management barriers along the roads edge.

Temple talk

The heritage-listed See Yup Temple in Raglan Street, South Melbourne, is rising from the ashes of a fire in February.

Historian and curator Dr Sophie Couchman will explore the historical, spiritual and cultural

heritage embodied by the temple and its contents at a free heritage talk on Monday 6 May at Emerald Hill Library at 6.30 pm.

The See Yup Temple is Australia's oldest continuously operating Chinese temple. The temple was built in 1866 and holds national significance.

Fortunately, the fire was restricted to the main building, and the Buddhist-Taoist temple's ancestral halls and adjacent buildings were spared. There was no damage done to the thousands of wooden plaques in the ancestral halls recording the names and places of origin of Chinese immigrants, many of them coming to work at the goldfields.



See Yup Society Vice-President Michael Lam said restoration works are almost ready to begin.

"It is important to us to restore the temple and its artefacts so its rich heritage can continue," Mr Lam said.

A temporary roof will soon be in place and a project management plan is being finalised. Once the roof provides further protection, work will also begin on expertly restoring those artefacts damaged in the blaze.

"There's still a lot of things to be done but we are excited that the restoration will soon be underway," Mr Lam said.

All three altars survived, with the grand altar completely untouched by the flames.

"One of the altars was burnt at the top and bottom but not where the god sits in the middle. I think I will pay more attention in the future when I put a joss stick in at the altar," Mr Lam smiled.

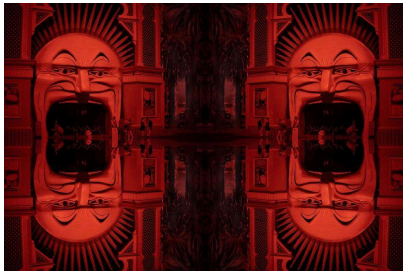

Apply for the Rupert Bunny Fellowship

Applications for the 2024 Rupert Bunny Foundation Visual Arts Fellowship are now open with local artists encouraged to apply for the \$30,000 acquisitive award.

The biennial fellowship supports professional artistic development and celebrates excellence in contemporary visual arts.

Diversity spoke to [Dr Lisa Anderson](#) who shared their experience receiving the Rupert Bunny Fellowship in 2022.

“It was an honour as the Rupert Bunny is quite prestigious,” Dr Anderson said. “It shifts a lot of things for an artist when they get that kind of recognition, and it gave me a lot of confidence.”

“Being the Rupert Bunny Fellow is a foot in the door. It’s a way to grab attention, and then everyone wants to know what you’re doing with the fellowship.”

Dr Anderson was awarded the fellowship for



Playwrights in the spotlight

Submissions open 1 May for an exciting creative development opportunity for emerging and experienced playwrights who call Port Phillip home.

To be presented in partnership with Melbourne Writers’ Theatre, the free Gasworks Script Lab will once again be delivered on-site at Gasworks Arts Park.

Participants will attend a series of writing workshops before further developing their new scripts in sessions with professional directors and actors. The program will culminate in two Script Showcases to be presented on stage to the public on October 22 and 23.

The Emerging stream, to be facilitated by short play enthusiast and teacher Michael Olsen, will cater for up to 10 aspiring writers who have never written for the stage but are interested in exploring the craft of playwriting. Participants will be

a multimedia, visual arts project, *Beguiling*, which was recently exhibited at the Victorian Pride Centre from November 2023 to January 2024.

As a member of the LGBTIQ+ community, Dr Anderson said it was important to be recognised within the pride community.

“The Pride Centre is a fabulous space, but it’s also an open public space and it meant a lot to me that so many people saw the exhibition and engaged with it.”

Beguiling is an evocative, multimedia exploration of changing landscapes and environmental collapse, casting an important spotlight on our approach to the ongoing climate emergency.

Dr Anderson's photographs hint at the measures we use in the doomsday clock made by scientists to demonstrate human impacts on Earth.

While the *Beguiling* exhibition is over, one neon sculpture, *Aurora: Dawn*, is still on display in the Pride Centre’s foyer area. Another *Beguiling* piece, *Aurora: Dawn #2* (neon), has been selected for the prestigious Blake Prize in Sydney.

Dr Anderson said one of the unexpected outcomes of *Beguiling* was having the exhibition promoted in a news article by *Broadsheet*.

“It was listed as one of the top 10 things to do over the summer. So, it was me next to the NGV and that’s pretty cool!”

As Dr Anderson’s artistic career continues to thrive, the 2022 Rupert Bunny Fellow shared some advice for artists looking to apply for the 2024 Fellowship.

“People should apply if they are connected to the Port Phillip area and want to talk about that connection in some way,” Dr Anderson said. “Don’t worry if you aren’t an established artist as it’s about the strength of your projects.”

Dr Anderson, now affectionately referred to as a “Bunny” along with other fellowship alumni, said joining the community of fellowship recipients continues to be rewarding for her career.

guided to write a short play from scratch.

In the Experienced stream, to be led by award-winning playwright and theatre-maker Laura Lethlean, up to six playwrights with one or more production credits will receive dramaturgical support to further develop the full-length play they are currently working on.

Participants must be available to attend all of the program sessions.

“Receiving the fellowship is a great way of connecting and entering into an artistic dialogue with a broader community and that within itself is extremely valuable.”

“The sharing of ideas has been really beneficial and the help along the way and connections made, including those through Council, becomes quite important as it’s all about creating community.”

Dr Anderson is currently the Artist in Residence for the Abbotsford Convent and has an upcoming project Searching for the Ghosts of Desire showing soon. Dr Anderson also looks forward to exhibiting another project in Sorrento’s &Gallery in December.

In 1991 a fire swept through St Kilda Town Hall destroying part of the building and its contents. A number of artworks were damaged including The Forerunners by Rupert Bunny – a significant and valuable painting.

In the spirit of the contribution Rupert Bunny made to the visual arts, the insurance funds from the painting were used to establish the Rupert Bunny Foundation.

The Rupert Bunny Foundation Visual Arts Fellowship was established in 2005 and aims to support contemporary visual artists with an identifiable commitment to visual arts excellence.

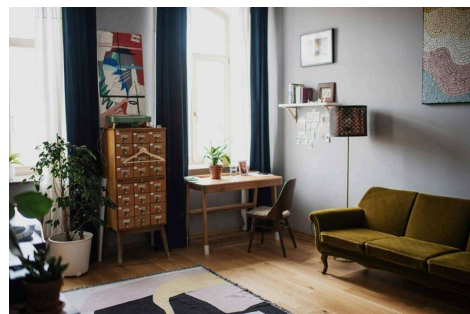
Winter comfort for renters

There are many things you can control to help you have a better renting experience and a more comfortable home over winter.

Sensitive Storytime

It's Sensitive Storytime and 12 young participants are enthusiastically scrunching colourful scarves into "flowers".

Just like the "flowers", these 3 to 5-year-olds are blossoming at a Storytime designed for children who are neuro-divergent or thrive in a quieter, more controlled environment.



While open to all children, Sensitive Storytime has been adapted from the preschool storytimes run by Port Phillip Library Service.

The differences are subtle but significant. Sensitive Storytimes are smaller and run before the library opens to reduce noise and interruptions.

A whiteboard sets out the order of activities and there is a comfy cubby-like area filled with cushions and a pair of noise cancelling headphones for children needing to take a break.

Just like any Storytime, however, books and songs with fun actions are shared by storyteller Leah. Most of the young participants throw themselves into the fun while a couple wander off to the side before returning when they feel ready to re-join the group.

Librarian Emma suggested offering a Sensitive Storytime after noticing some neuro-divergent children were becoming distressed or disruptive during regular storytimes. Examples of neuro-divergence include Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) and Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD).

"Sensitive Storytime is a great way to help children who do best in a quieter environment to develop and enjoy positive associations with reading, learning and social play from an early age. It's also an important way of showing that our libraries are inclusive and everyone is welcome," Emma said.

Port Phillip Bay is a safer home for native marine animals following Earthcare St Kilda removing a tonne of invasive Northern Pacific Sea Stars over 2023.

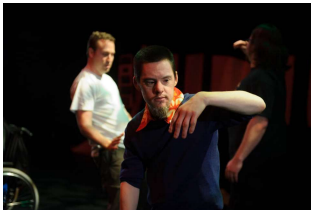
The marine pest is a voracious predator which feeds on species such as mussels, pipis, ascidians and sea snails.

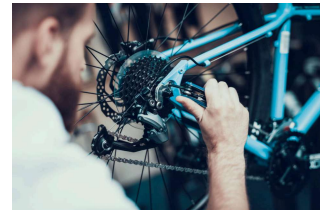
Spoil mum this Mother's Day
